This Group is also responsible for adapting PLMA training materials to address new industry trends and methods of instruction.

▲ Concept

Adjust PLMA Governance Model While Enhancing Member Engagement:

- A Reflect Executive Committee role in Governance
- ▲ Explore Current Board's Value as Interactive Advisors to PLMA

▲ Background

- ▲ PLMA and the DR, load management, and managed charging sectors we serve are rapidly evolving and growing.
- ▲ Current Board structure was created ~17 years ago
 - \triangle 2006 -> BoD = ~30 members
 - ▲ 2012 -> BoD = ~40 members
 - Current BoD = 140 members
- ▲ A version of the Executive Committee was initiated in 2006

PLMA Board Reconfiguration: What & Why?



Rationale

Focused & Optimized Engagement

- ▲ Current Board of Directors possesses **knowledge**, **experience**, **and insights** that are invaluable to PLMA.
- A Recasting this body as a **Board of Advisors** communicates an implicit role that is distinct from a Board of Directors, and more appropriate.
- ▲ Transition allows PLMA to establish an expectation and affords members of the Board of Advisors an opportunity to calibrate expectations and step into an active, advisory role.

PLMA's Governance & Board Model



Rationale

Practical Governance

- ▲ Cause: PLMA and the load management sector we serve have evolved, grown, and matured.
- ▲ **Effect:** Expansion of governance responsibilities, and a significant change in the cadence required to direct the organization.
- ▲ **Comment:** A Board of Directors has specific duties which have been increasingly met by the Executive Committee and not necessarily by the Board of Directors. It makes sense to align the naming convention with the duties being performed.
